

On October 25, 2018, I was riding with a small group of women on the Dascombe Trail (Lone Grave area). My horse tripped and went down on her knees. We were on a descent, so when I ended up on her neck I knew she could not get up. I slid around and stood up, still holding onto her neck. All was well until I let go of her neck, and the round rock I was standing on rolled out from under me. I went down onto my arm (still really hurts, but not broken) and rolled to my side. I don't remember what happened right after that. I was told that the horse in front of me backed up and stepped on my face.

As I was getting my bearings, I heard yelling and somehow got myself off the trail. A bicyclist had come careening down the trail, unaware that a group with horses was stopped in the middle of the trail. The horse to the rear, whose rider

was attending me, panicked and ran off into the brush. Fortunately, because I was off the trail, I didn't get trampled by the three horses behind me.

The air was blue with cursing and yelling at the cyclist, and pleas for help. Instead, he completely ignored our pleas, picked up his bike and tramped around us, circumnavigating through the brush alongside the

trail. I glanced up to see him peering at me through the bushes as one friend begged him for help. Perhaps he saw all the blood on my face and decided to get gone fast.

Meanwhile, GCTC members Linda Lanzoni and Irv Mazur were riding in the area and heard the commotion. They came to our assistance and thank goodness they did: my fellow riders were unfamiliar with the trails and did not know the way back to the staging area. We were not far from Rock Creek Road, so with Linda's guidance they found their way back to our rigs, and were able to take me to the ER, then take the horses home.

My diagnosis was a major concussion and lacerations. My nose was broken, and a deep gash required many stitches over my eye, including my eyebrow. My cheek bone was also torn open. I was lucky.

While the bicyclist was not the cause of this accident, his speeding into the midst of stopped horses and riders certainly exacerbated an already bad situation. I could easily have been trampled as I lay in the trail. The fact that he did not stay to assist, even after pleas for help, is disappointing to say the least.

I do not know how long it will be until I can ride again. Perhaps a few more months. I am still having difficulties with processing thought, while physically I'm pretty good. Since my brain is not cooperating, I have resigned my position as Treasurer of GCTC.

My deepest thanks to the incredible group of riding buddies who attended me, to Linda and Irv, and to all who helped me through the first difficult day and following weeks.

Yes, I will wear a helmet in the future.

## USE PARK WATCH REPORT - No Matter How Trivial...For Everyone's Safety

Before Teri's accident, she rode with Willie and Sue Brusin to Peter Grubb Hut (located below Castle Peak in Round Valley, 3 miles north of the Castle Peak trailhead near I-80) and beyond. They encountered bicycles and noted many tire tracks on the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT).

Teri then contacted Janet Peterson of Park Watch Report. Here is Janet's response:

Thank you for your report on PCT and bikes using it. I have suggested a number of times that the PCT directors install ParkWatchReport signs on the trail so that more trail users, like yourself, would know to report such incidents. This trail is very remote and even a small "accident" on it could turn tragic.



*I am going to use your report to bring the subject back up. Thank you! And <u>encourage your fellow</u> <u>equestrians to report, report, report!</u> <u>No matter how trivial an observation might seem or how repetitive,</u> <u>every report counts</u> towards making changes in our trail system to improve the safety of everyone.*

### HOW CAN YOU USE PARK WATCH REPORT?

- 1. Download the ParkWatchReport app to your phone from Apple's App Store or Google Play
- 2. Open the app and click on File a Report
- 3. Fill in the pertinent information (include photos)
- 4. Identify your exact location by clicking on "Locate Me"
- 5. Click on Submit Incident Report
- 6. You have just alerted the local land manager and done your part as a conscious steward




